

Fun activities to try at home

Science—Electricity

There are lots of different activities that your child can try at home to apply their electricity learning. You may like to:

 Charge a comb by rubbing it on your head and watch the water 'bend' as it comes out of the tap!





Charge a plastic spoon by rubbing it against your head, then use it to 'magically' separate pepper from salt!!

Use a smooth sheet of glass or plastic, a straw and some bubble solution. If you don't have any bubble solution, you can make your own using dish soap and a little water. Once it's ready, spread your bubble solution on the sheet and blow some big bubbles using the straw. Bring a charged object like a balloon near the bubbles and they'll follow the object around!





Using these symbols for a bulb, switch, cell and wires, can you create some circuit drawings?
